Structure, Governance and Management

The Group is an unincorporated recognised Scottish charity and is governed by the terms detailed in its constitution. It is a member of The Scout Association having accepted the aims of the Association. The Group Council is the electoral body which supports Scouting in the Scout Group. It is the body to which the Group Executive Committee is accountable. The Group Council must hold an Annual General Meeting within eight months of the financial year end to adopt the Annual Report of the Group Executive Committee, including the Annual Statement of Accounts. The Group Council must approve the Group Scout Leader's nomination of the Group Chairman and nominated members of the Group Executive Committee, elect a Group Secretary and a Group Treasurer and elect certain members of the Group Executive Committee. The Group Executive Committee exists to support the Group Scout Leader in meeting the responsibilities of his appointment. The Committee is responsible for the maintenance of the Group's property and equipment, the raising of funds and the administration of the Group's finance, the insurance of persons, property and equipment, group public occasions and assisting with the recruitment of leaders and other adult support.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

New trustees are recruited as and when required from existing and new contacts. Any newly appointed trustees are advised of the objectives and activities of the Group, and are to act in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of the Scout Association and the Charities & Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 in force at the date of appointment. Assistance and training is provided to new trustees by the existing trustees and all new Office Bearers are trained and validated in Module 1 of The Scout Association's National Adult Training Scheme by Dunfermline District Scout Council.

Risks

The Group is dependent upon receiving sufficient funding and donations to enable it to continue to work towards achieving its objectives.

Objectives and Activities

The aim of the Group is to promote the aims of The Scout Association which are to contribute to the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities.

Volunteers

In addition to eleven uniformed Leaders, approximately twenty five parents of young people attending the Scout Group helped with various activities to raise funds or just to help out. It is difficult to put a monetary value on this input, but the results of our volunteer help can easily be appreciated.

Achievements and Performance

It has been another successful year for the Scout Group with all of our members progressing through the Award Scheme, gaining their Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum and Diamond Chief Scout's Awards as well as numerous Activity Badges. Each Section has had its highlights and these are detailed later in this Annual Report. The Group provides a programme of activities including progression through the various Scouting awards for young people. We provide activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Villages area, based in Cairneyhill, with a current membership of 125. We are particularly pleased that the Group's Network Section for 18-25 year olds has taken off and currently has 22 members.

The Scout Method provides an enjoyable and attractive scheme of progressive training, based on the Scout Promise and Law which is guided by adult leadership, in practice this is best seen when young people, in partnership with adults are:

- Enjoying what they are doing
- Learning by doing
- Participating in varied and progressive activities
- Making choices for themselves
- Taking responsibilities for their own actions
- Working in groups
- Taking responsibility for others
- Taking part in outdoor activities
- Sharing in prayer and worship
- Making and living out their Promise

Our Group contributes to the Scottish Government's Curriculum for Excellence Programme by creating confident individuals, successful learners, effective contributors and responsible citizens. Our members work on the following learning areas which fit directly into the aims of the Fife Community Plan of making Fife's communities safer and creating a better educated Fife; Working with others; Self –awareness; Communication skills; Intercultural and global awareness; Problem solving; Review and evaluation; Health and Safety; Citizenship; Project theme skills and Number and Information Technology.

The Group also contributes to Fife Council's Big 8 Priorities by offering improved sport, leisure and cultural opportunities to young people in the West Fife Villages.

The Scout Group in Cairneyhill provides a community facility for the village that is regularly used by the After-School Club; the Playgroup; the Brownies; the Youth Club; Karate and Dance Groups; Football Teams and for one-off lets. It is also used as a Polling Station for all elections. We also provide two 17-seater minibuses that are regularly used by a variety of local groups from playgroups to groups of those who are retired. Scouting in Cairneyhill is most definitely a part of the community, not apart from the community, and will continue to support others in the future.

This summer two of our Explorers (Jamie Dallman and Lachlan Peters) will represent Scotland at the 22nd World Scout Jamboree in Sweden. We wish them all the best for their experience of a lifetime and look forward to hearing of their adventures.

Financial Review

The group recorded a deficit for the year of £16,793 compared with a surplus of £12,416 in 2010. £4,800 of this year's deficit is explained by some fundraising monies raised by the Explorers in the previous financial year being spent in this past one on their Expedition to Japan. Equally, some grant monies (£1,342) for the purchase of the minibus and associated items was received in the previous financial year, but only spent in the past one. These figures also include the depreciation of the two Group minibuses which are very new and, therefore, the depreciation amounts are high. The Group is at present in a healthy financial state and is confident that its income will once again exceed its expenditure in the current financial year.

Reserves Policy

The Group Executive Committee have agreed that the level of free reserves, being the unrestricted funds, which are required to sustain operations in the event of unforeseen adverse future financial events should be a minimum of three months operating costs.

Investment Policy

Surplus funds are held in a bank account which generates a small level of investment income.

Plans for the Future

The group remains committed to providing an exciting programme of activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Village area. Planning Permission has recently been received from Fife Council and a number of funding applications submitted to extend the hall to provide additional storage for other local community organisations.

Trustees Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper books and records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the group and enable them to ensure that the financial statements, which they are responsible for preparing, comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The applicable law also sets out the responsibilities of the trustees for the preparation and content of the Trustees Annual Report. Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the group and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Examiner

A resolution to re-appoint Iain A T Mowat CA as independent examiner will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting on 29th June 2011.

Annual Report for 01 April 2010 – 31 March 2011

Our Cub Pack have had another busy and enjoyable year – we spent the summer meetings doing activities and games outdoors and in the winter months practiced scouting skills such as first aid, pioneering and navigation. Some of the highlights of the year were the Fordell Fast Forward camp, the Gala float and a trip to Megazone. We also had our first ever girls joining the pack and welcomed a new Section Assistant – Sharon Craig. Throughout the year, the Cubs have taken part in a wide variety of activities, outings and games, covering the programme zones in Cub Scouting. Here's what we have been doing in the different zones:

Outdoor and Adventure

In May, some of the older Cubs attended Fordell Fast Forward – a camp held jointly with younger Scouts at Fordell Firs. For once it stayed dry and the Cubs enjoyed a fantastic weekend packed full of activities, including bell boating, bungee trampoline, backwoods cooking, grass sledging and abseiling. There was a carnival on the Saturday night after which the whole camp joined together for campfire songs.

The Cubs love going outdoors and our first outing was to Aberdour beach for a barbeque. The rain didn't stop us all enjoying paddling, building sandcastles and toasting marshmallows. We followed this with a hike to Crossford with the Cubs taking part in various team challenges along the route. As always, we fitted in visits to Fordell Firs for caving and the climbing tower – something we always enjoy.

We finished up each term with an outing and went bowling and to Megazone (a firm favourite with the Cubs).

Creative

We all had a great time at the Gala parade and winning second place for our 'Thriller' themed float made the effort the Cubs put into making their Zombie costumes and painting tombstones to decorate the float worthwhile. Throughout the year, we got creative with lots of different materials, making mashed potato sculptures, mini-pioneering with sweets and toothpicks and inventing camp gadgets to make out of junk. In September we took part in the Pallet Garden competition, with six of the Cubs designing and creating a garden at the Fife Flower Show. At Christmas, we painted tree decorations and parent Clare James came along to help the Cubs make Christmas cards. Our Raingutter Regatta has become an annual event and this year the Cubs made and decorated wooden boats and spent an exciting evening racing them against each other. The Cubs also had great fun making their own radio advert, poster and video to promote Cub Scouting.

Fitness

Global

The Pack always enjoy international themed programmes and this year we had a French night when we sampled cheeses and garlic bread, built an Eiffel tower out of spaghetti and learned some French words. We were also lucky to have three of the Explorers along to tell us about their visit to Japan. We were treated to some Japanese food and drink, allowed to dress up in Japanese clothes and Scout uniforms and shown the souvenirs which they had brought back with them. The Cubs also saw a slide show of the visit to Japan and were reminded that some of them may get the opportunity to go to a World Jamboree in Japan when they eventually join the Explorer Section.

Community

To raise money for charity our Pack held a fundraising evening in the hall and brought money to spend on raffles, home baking and stalls. We raised over £50.00 for the charity 'Lemon Aid' – a local charity which raises money to support orphanages in Haiti. Thanks to all of the Cubs who brought in biscuits and cakes to sell.

Age Range (10 ½ – 14)

The Scouting movement is based in two streams. The first one holds together the traditions, values and philosophy of the organisation, the basis of which fosters the service to the community and environment through training and team building. The Troop organisation forms the heart of this by providing a means of giving and encouraging the necessary structured training and leadership.

The second stream gives the opportunity and encouragement of putting this training and leadership into a wider arena via camping, activities, outings, teaching other scouts and expeditions on a regular basis.

The 83rd Scout Group is particularly successful in meeting these aims following another year of providing an exciting and creative programme of events. I shall now tell about our how we as a Troop participated in these types of events.

- **Religion:** in attending church on Remembrance Day and Founder's Day. These services are aimed at any religion. Remembering on a daily basis to do your duty to God and to the Queen.
- **Community:** by helping the environment in a clean up in Dunfermline. Our contribution to "Cairneyhill in Bloom" is planting and maintaining the tubs outside the Scout Hall. Visiting and finding out about Longannet Power Station. Helping in a project at Inzievar Woods plus Scouts helping at the Beaver and Cub Sections.
- **International:** This is not always covered by attending camps abroad. We use the experience of the Explorer Section to give an insight into the lives of others in different countries. This year we learnt a lot about Gambia due to having some Explorers able to visit the country and do community work there. We also supported the Malawi appeal. This was to raise £6000 from the UK, for The Scout Association of Malawi, not only to help young people there experience Scouting, but also to simply allow the Movement to continue.
- **District events:** We have competed in the Gibb Bugle camping competition, Raft Race, Sports Day, Scout and Guide Quiz and The Willie Robertson Trophy. To all the team members a very Big thank you and Well Done.
- **Camps** are not as popular they used to be, but we are encouraging as many Scouts as possible to attend, some camps are indoors, some in tents. The best part of Scouting is after all the outdoors. We had a really good weekend at the Fordell Fast Forward camp this was a joint camp with the older Cub Scouts. The weekend was very successful all Cubs and Scouts mixing well and trying new activities.
- **Challenge Badges:** The Scout Section has nine Challenge Badges. To gain the Chief Scout's Gold Award you have to have gained eight Challenge Badges. These average out at two a year while in the Scout section; as always we are achieving this.

Hopefully this has given you an insight into what the Scout Troop has been doing over the last year.

Thanks must go to the Executive Committee members for all their hard work in keeping the hall running, and in assisting the leaders in ensuring we have the resources to run the programmes. More members are required on the Executive Committee. We also need representation for the Scout Section.

All of this would not be possible without the Leaders and I thank Norrie and David for all the time and support they give to the Scouts and me. We make a great team. Thank you to the Leaders from all the other sections for your support and help over the last year. This was really very much appreciated as I had to stand back for a while due to my husband's illness and who now has sadly passed away. Many thanks also to Scott Mitchell an Explorer Scout from the 62nd group who has been doing the Service Section for the Duke of Edinburgh Award he has been coming along every week to help run the programme for the Scouts this help is very much appreciated. Also to you the parents for your support and encouragement, maybe a little more encouragement is required in getting the Scouts motivated into attending more events. Let us make 2011 the best yet.

Scouting as an educational charity has a big part to play and the purpose of Scouting (to contribute to the development of young people in achieving their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potentials, as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities) is almost identical to the aims of the Curriculum for Excellence. So what have Explorer members achieved in the past year?

successful learners

- 30 who went to Japan last summer learnt basic phrases in Japanese; and completed a series of homework tasks in preparation for monthly meetings on Japanese culture; practiced using chopsticks and trying a variety of Japanese foods so that they knew the names of things they liked and disliked; and ran a number of activity evenings on return from Japan to educate other groups on the cultural differences and what they had learnt
- achieved a number of Scouting activity badges and progress awards

responsible citizens

- the 30 who went to Japan last summer learnt about Japanese culture and customs; learnt about Scotland, practiced Scottish Country Dancing and how to prepare and present a variety of Scottish snacks and games; visited Buddhist temples and Shinto shrines and took part in ceremonies at each to gain a better understanding of world faiths and what they believe in
- have undertaken at least 13 hours of volunteering, either with the younger sections in Scouting or with a variety of other organisations locally
- have had visits from the local Drug & Alcohol Team and Sexual Health Nurse

confident individuals

- participated in a wide variety of adventurous activities during the summer expedition to Japan including climbing Mount Fuji either to the top or part-way up and kayaking in the Pacific Ocean and danced on stage in front of 20,000
- undertook a period living in homes with families in Japan and hosted either Swedish or Japanese Scouts in their homes in Fife last July
- participated in snow activities at Glenshee (8 days) and/or in Sweden (2 weeks)
- have caved, hovercrafted, mountain biked, hiked, rafted and climbed
- participated in up to 60 nights away, residential experiences during the year

effective contributors

- fundraised over £36,000 through hard physical labour
- been awarded £26,753 of grants towards the year's activities and equipment
- communicated non-verbally when required and verbally in formal situations in Japan and communicated effectively with host families who had little English
- been selected to represent East Scotland Region as part of the Patrols for Blair Atholl Jamboree last July or the World Scout Jamboree in Sweden this summer

Highlights:

The photos on the Group Website demonstrate the variety of activities and the great fun that has been had during the past year – who can forget the Shortbread Jenga and edible art workshop in July with our friends from Malung; the great times with our friends in Japan (particularly in the fishing villages that were almost completely destroyed by the Tsunami in March); searching for Neil's camouflage sleeping bag that had fallen off his rucksack in a German forest in October!; riding the highest and fastest rollercoaster in Europe; enjoying the best start to a ski season in Scotland for many years in November; experiencing the cold of minus 30' in February in Sweden (the minibuss engine didn't like it much); and riding the surf-machine in the swimming pool for the first time for those that hadn't been skiing with us at Easter before. Lots of good memories.

Looking ahead:

Two members of the Unit are representing East of Scotland Region at this summer's World Scout Jamboree in Sweden and we look forward to seeing and hearing about their adventures later in the year. We have booked up to visit California this October flying to and from Los Angeles. We hope to visit Hollywood and Beverley Hills, Six Flags Magic Mountain Theme Park, Hoover Dam and Las Vegas, Death Valley and Yosemite, John Muir Redwoods and Golden Gate Bridge, San Francisco and Alcatraz, Great America Theme Park, Monterey Aquarium and Hearst Castle; and have homestays in and around Monterey Bay. It'll be a busy two weeks, but again packed full of new experiences and lots of memories. Other sections will be able to see what we're doing through the photos on the website.

As always I'll finish off with my thanks. Your youngsters wouldn't get all the opportunities that they do if it wasn't for the help and support that the Parents' Committee (The Scout Group Executive) provide by running and maintaining the hall, looking after insurance for the minibusses, purchasing the equipment etc. It really would help to have additional pairs of hands to help with these tasks! Particular thanks to Jackie Brown as Chair for the extra pressure when there are fewer parents involved and to Rob Albans for looking after the Group Accounts all year and in all the extra work involved in sorting out the overseas minibuss insurances when the engine had to be replaced in Sweden!

Thanks also to Colin Couper and his maintenance team for starting work on the bits and pieces about the hall – hopefully we'll have some Explorers to help and learn from you.

Equally, those leaders/helpers that selflessly take time off work to look after / drive / teach /encourage your youngsters on the many camps and activities, particularly Lindsay Morris and Alan McKinlay. Our regular "instructors" Jimmy Kilbane and Andy Morgan and of course my Assistant Leaders Bob Henderson and Calum Miller. 1. Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005.

Donations

Donations and similar incoming resources are included in the year in which they are receivable.

Other Incoming Resources

Voluntary income includes donations receivable in the year. Income from trading activities and charitable income are included when earned.

Investment Income

Investment income is included in the accounts when receivable.

Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the group. If part of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose, they are designated in a separate unrestricted fund. Each year an amount is transferred from the designated funds to the unrestricted fund which represents the depreciation charge of tangible fixed assets which have been acquired as a result of specific funding or donations.

The Deferred Income Fund represents grants received towards capital projects which are released to the Income and Expenditure Account at the same rate as the depreciation on the assets to which the grants relate.

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific requirements as to their use which may be declared by the donor or with their authority or created through legal processes, but still within the wider objects of the group.

Resources Expended

All expenditure is included within the financial statements on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay. The group is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT. Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in these cost categories. Certain other costs which are attributable to more than one activity, hall costs and minibus costs, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of 25% of total costs incurred to fundraising activities and 75% of total costs incurred to charitable activities on those activities.

1. Accounting Policies (continued)

Fixed Assets

Heritable Property and Motor Vehicles are recorded at cost

Equipment has been recorded at a value based on a percentage of estimated replacement cost due to the absence of original cost details. Items older than five years old are written down by 50% and items under five years old have been written down by 10% with the resultant total treated as the cost equivalent in accordance with SORP 2005.

New equipment under £2,000 is written off in the year of acquisition.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful life of that asset as follows:

Heritable Property	- 2% straight line per annum
Equipment	-20% reducing balance per annum
Motor Vehicles	- 25% reducing balance per annum
