It has been another successful year for the Cairneyhill Scout Group with all of our members progressing through the Award Scheme, gaining their Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum and Diamond Chief Scout's Awards as well as numerous Activity Badges. My World

Remembrance Day and Founder's Day services; Learning about Scottish Cuisine; the meaning of Tartan and Kilts; Planting Pansies; Learning about Japan from the Explorers; Disability Awareness, learning how to sign Beavers in sign Language, Braille games and Lighthouse game (blindfolded)

Teamwork

Team challenge activities and team games; Leading an evening and choosing and being in charge of a game; Lodge leaders leading by example; Be welcoming and kind to new Beavers; Building Lego Roads; Creating and Drawing pictures together

Chief Scout's Bronze Awards

The highest award that a Beaver can gain is awarded if they have completed six of the Challenge badges and have gained four activity /staged activity badges. The Beavers who have swam up to Cubs this year have mostly achieved their Chief Scout's Bronze Award.

A few of the highlights of the past year:

Beaver Outing to the Fire Station 18th Sept 2018

Dunfermline fire Station invited the Beavers to spend an evening at the fire station where they were given a presentation on fire safety before being allowed to try on and practice using the equipment the fire fighters use when attending a fire, they were shown where and how the equipment is stored within the station and were given the opportunity to call and pass messages to the fire station and heard how the call is alerted through the speakers, the evening finished with the Beavers being taken outside to be allowed on the fire engines and sound the sirens but the highlight of the evening was being able to use the hoses and be shown how to put out a fire!

Young Leader Night - Japan

The Young Leaders prepared the programme for the evening. The Beavers learned about Japan through games, a slide show and talking to the Explorers where they learned about the size, population, cuisine and climate as well as learning how to use chopsticks and make their own homemade fans. The Beavers also got to try on some traditional Japanese clothing that the Explorers had brought back from their travels and had a taste of some Japanese Sweets. A very informative and fun evening.

Our Beaver Flower Tub

The Beaver flower tub is usually planted every year by the oldest Beavers. The Beavers are then asked to take a week being responsible for its watering and maintenance. The Beavers also normally plant and water another two tubs nearby. Unfortunately, we have been unable to attend to the tubs this year however donations for the tubs were made by the Beavers.

Scouting exists to actively engage and support young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society with a strong focus on the outdoors. Scouts aims to build and develop young people's confidence, sense of adventure and outdoor skills, as well as encouraging them to explore their beliefs and attitudes and be creative. It offers them the independence to put these skills into practice at camps and even on international trips. Scouts are encouraged to work together and take the lead on all sorts of projects, from community-based work to planning games and activities for their meetings. The Scout Troop has tried to deliver this through a mix of training and personal development not only during the regular troop nights but also at weekends and other opportunities as available. Our programme is based around camping, outdoor activities, outings and expeditions on a regular basis. Scouts are encouraged to participate in these activities as much as possible but we are also conscious of the many other demands that are placed on these young people through academic and other personal pursuits. We try to provide an exciting and creative programme of events throughout the year and some of these are detailed below.

Challenge and Activity Awards – The core training programme for all Scouts is based around completion of 9 Challenge Awards to obtain the Chief Scout's Gold Award. The new Challenge Awards offer Scouts many options for activities to complete allowing greater flexibility for mixed abilities and interests. In addition, there are also the Activity Badges and Staged Awards which allow Scouts to recognise their individual interests both within and outside of Scouting. As part of the Chief Scout Award it is a requirement to earn 6 Activity or Staged badges to reflect the individual nature of each Scout's ability and interests. During the year we normally pursue a theme each term which provides the scouts with an opportunity to spend some time developing a given skill and should cover the requirements of at least one Challenge Award or Staged Badge. We also encourage Scouts to work on their own initiative to supplement the training provided on troop nights to gain additional levels of the Activity or Staged Badges. Most of the troop members who hadn't previously obtained them were able to gain their 1st or 2nd Stage Swimmers Award, World Challenge, Personal Challenge and Skills Challenge Awards. We also learnt about the RAF's 100 Anniversary this year which combined with some further work will earn Scouts their Air Researcher Activity Badge. The older Scouts have also nearly completed their Expedition Challenge Award. There were no Chief Scout Gold Awards this year but we are hopeful that by the 2019 AGM we should have 4 or 5 completing the requirements of the award.

Outings and Visitors– Trips to external locations or external speakers visiting our troop night are also important to provide Scouts with an insight into our local and sometimes not so local community. Trips out this year included Trampolining in Alloa, Dunfermline Swimming Pool, beach clean-up at The Ness, Torryburn and our annual end of term beach party at Silver Sands Beach. We had a return visit to the hall from Guide Dogs for the Blind at which time we were able to finally hand over the donation we had previously collected. We also attended Church Parades this year for Remembrance Sunday and Founders Day. Joint activities with the Explorers on some events such as supporting Scotland Football Team at Hampden Park, skiing in Sweden, Winter Camp and survival camps help to provide the Scouts with an insight into some of the activities they can expect when they move up to Explorers.

Communications - One element of the programme that we have introduced is having at least one open evening each year for the parents and carers to attend and find out a little more about what goes on over the year. Previously we had completed a variety of Art projects using different media and a very successful Christmas Concert last year using Dean's musical skills and teaching to great effect. Unfortunately, due to losing Dean and work commitments for the others, we weren't able to organise the open evening this year. We hope to do again for the 2019-2020 programme. A Facebook closed group exists for all parents and carers to join (along with any Scouts old enough) so that we can provide regular news and photos of each week's activity as well as advising of any changes to the programme with short notice.

Expeditions and Camps – No year would be complete without camps and hikes and this year was no exception. We enjoyed the ever-popular weekend camp at Strathaven Airfield with the flying experience provided by Norrie, practice competition camps and shared survival camp with the Explorers. We also held a summer camp at Great Tower Scout Camp on Lake Windermere. Again, the weather was very kind to us and we covered activities including kayaking, climbing, swimming, hill walking, trips on stream train and the lake cruisers as well as visit to the South Lakes Animal Park and the lighthouse that isn't a lighthouse! (the Hoad Monument at Ulverston). Thanks to Mike our Assistant Cub Scout Leader who stepped in to help run the camp.

District Events – Members of the troop took part in all the District Scout events this year. This included a mix of fun and sporting events like the Scout Raft Race and District Sports Day as well as some of the more traditional Scouting based competitive events such as the Gibb Bugle Camping Competition (we came 3rd), Willie Robertson Trophy (our patrol came 3rd and two extras were 'loaned' to the 40th Fife who won the competition) and Scout and Guide Quiz. There was also a return to the calendar of the 6 a side Hockey Tournament (runners up) which was organised by our troop with support from Dunfermline Carnegie Hockey Club. By entering teams in all these District competitions, those taking part have enjoyed the activity and most are keen to take part next year which is always a good sign by which time they will have developed more experience.

Community and International – We have organised community specific activities aimed at giving the Scouts an understanding and appreciation of their local and international community. This included the beach clean-up at Torryburn. The older scouts have continued to support the Cub and Beaver sections as part of their community challenge and progression towards their Saltire Award. The international dimension was provided by joining the Explorers on skiing trip to Sweden and also talks from Explorers about their overseas expeditions.

My thanks:

Regrettably Dean left us this year which once again has meant there is no Assistant Scout Leader and the troop has been reliant on the help from Alison and Darren when their work commitments allow. They have both been a great help this year.

As well as the uniformed support the Troop wouldn't be able to function without the weekly helpers' rota which most parents and carers have supported along with some of the older members of the movement - notably Caleece and Dylan this year.

Parents and carers are a great help, not only in encouraging their children to attend but also in practical support via the weekly rota. This is a very important part they play, not only in being there to help each week but also so that they gain an idea what the Scouts are up to throughout the year. There are always opportunities for parents to assist in several roles by becoming the section rep on the Executive Committee, volunteering for some of the activities required over the

year to help support the funding and running of the hall. If any parents feel they may be able to undertake any additional support with the Troop please let me know and I am happy to discuss the various ways in which this support can be given.

Lastly, it would be remiss not to recognise the support that both the Executive and other uniformed leaders within the Group have provided this year. Often unsung and largely hidden from view this support is integral to the success of the Troop and the Group overall.

EXPLORERS

With over twenty active youngsters aged 14 to 17 it's always difficult to keep them busy; provide something to suit everyone; and ensure that we are contributing positively to their personal development, but we have tried and have had a busy year.

#skills for life are what our members achieve and this is partly through their participation in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme undertaking volunteering, physical activity, an expedition and skills over the year. However, in addition we try and prepare them for the world of work with relevant certification and this year we have undertaken First Aid and Elementary Food Hygiene.

Through our Intermediate Labour Market we employ the Explorers @ £5 per hour giving them valuable work experience undertaking catering for large events; event stewarding; marquee hire and leaflet/magazine distribution as well as providing the baggage service at many of Scotland's marathons and road races. We brought in nearly £39,000 over the year and ensured that the Explorers could pay for their activities and expeditions without relying on contributions from their parents. We provide employment references as required, based on their experience and expertise.

Each term the members discuss and decide what activities they'd like to do and each time that we organize a longer expedition abroad, the activities are based on the wishes of those who are participating. Equally, helping the younger sections as Young Leaders gives our members valuable skills and helps to develop their leadership potential. They use this volunteering towards their Duke of Edinburgh's and count the hours towards the Saltire Awards that recognize youth volunteering. We are delighted that so many of our members are willing to give up additional hours to help out at Beavers, Cubs and Scouts.

During the year four of the Unit (Caleece Albans, Alec Davidson, Lyle Hopkins and Dylan Jack) represented Dunfermline at the International Patrol Jamborette at Blair Atholl camping with our friends from Sweden, Japan and Ecuador and Caleece and Lyle are about to fly off to USA to represent Scotland at the 24th World Scout Jamboree.

Skiing in Sweden was once again very popular at both Easter and during the school February mid-term holiday, allowing us to further develop our links with the Scout Group in Malung. With no-one else on the slopes at Easter, we enjoyed great snow and great weather with everyone achieving their Level 3 Snowsports Staged Activity Badge.

Thanks to everyone that has helped over the past year – leaders, parents and Executive members. As always it's a pleasure to work with the Explorers and to help them gain Skills for Life.

The Explorers' major summer expedition in 2018 was to Japan, where 25 of us had a wonderful three weeks, exploring the cities of Tokyo, Kyoto and Hiroshima as well as the magical island of Miyajima before participating in the 17th Nippon Jamboree in Ishikawa Prefecture for a week. Afterwards we travelled to the north of the mainland and enjoyed two periods of home hospitality, one in the coastal town of Kamaichi and one in Morioka, capital of Iwate Prefecture.

In Tokyo we saw the size of the city from the top of the local Government building (45 stories high) and the efficiency of their trains. We were staying in a Buddhist Temple and were given a really informative tour of the complex. We visited some of their famous shopping areas and crossed the “world’s busiest pedestrian crossing” at Shibuya. In Kyoto we visited temples, castles and the wonderful food market seeing the huge array of what was on offer. Staying in the local Catholic Church Hall we phoned for a takeaway for dinner (mix of sushi and pizza!). In Hiroshima we visited the Peace Museum and Park, seeing the A-Dome where the bomb fell. This made a big impression on everyone. Whilst there we visited the offshore island of Miyajima and its friendly deer, hosted by one of our friends who has visited Scotland several times. Thanks Isao.

The Jamboree (on a beach) enabled everyone to integrate into a Japanese Group and eat, sleep and do activities with them for a week. Great insight into Japanese Scouting and the shows in the main arena were spectacular. After the camp we headed off by bullet train to the north of Japan and enjoyed our first night in a Spa Hotel which was outstanding. We then headed to Kamaichi (a town destroyed by the 2011 Tsunami) and saw the regeneration that has taken place, culminating in them being selected as one of the 12 host cities for the autumn Rugby World Cup. They were wonderful hosts and the Farewell Party that they held alongwith BBQ Scallops, will be remembered for a long time. Then we travelled on to Morioka and after a welcome party with a huge array of food and lots of dancing with their Beavers, Cubs and Scouts, we had some more time with families, culminating in a noodle-eating competition before we had to say our farewells and return to Tokyo for a final night before we had to catch the long flight home. An unforgettable experience and it'll be good to see some of our Japanese friends again in Switzerland this summer celebrating their Group's 70th anniversary.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Group is an unincorporated recognised Scottish Charity and is governed by the terms detailed in the constitution of The Scout Association (incorporated by Royal Charter in 1912) and as detailed in its Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) and as amended by its Scottish Variations. It is a member of The Scout Association having accepted the aims of the Association. The Group Council is the electoral body which supports scouting in the Scout Group. It is the body to which the Group Executive Committee is accountable.

The Group Council must hold an Annual General Meeting within six months of the financial year end to: receive and consider the Annual Report of the Group Executive Committee, including the annual statement of accounts; to approve the Group Scout Leader's nomination of the Group Chairman and nominated members of the Group Executive Committee; elect a Group Secretary and a Group Treasurer; elect certain members of the Group Executive Committee; and appoint an independent examiner. Members of the Executive Committee must act collectively as Charity Trustees in the best interests of its members to:

- Comply with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association
- Protect and maintain any property and equipment owned by and used by the Group
- Manage the Group finances
- Provide insurance for people, property and equipment
- Provide sufficient resources for Scouting to operate. This includes, but is not limited to, supporting recruitment, other adult support, and fundraising activities
- Promote and support the development of Scouting in the local area
- Manage and implement the Safety Policy locally
- Ensure that a positive image of Scouting exists in the local community
- Appoint and manage the operation of any sub-Committees, including appointing Chairs to lead the sub-Committees
- Ensure that Young People are meaningfully involved in decision making at all levels within the Group
- The opening, closure and amalgamation of Sections in the Group as necessary
- Maintain confidentiality with regard to appropriate Executive Committee business

Organisational Structure

The trustees meet 8 times a year and determine policy as well as reviewing finance and determining operational matters.

Recruitment, Appointment and Induction of Trustees

New trustees are recruited in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules (POR) of The Scout Association as and when required from existing and new contacts. Any newly appointed trustees are advised of the objectives and activities of the Group, and are to act in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules of the Scout Association and the Charities & Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 in force at the date of appointment. Assistance and training is provided to new trustees by the existing trustees and all new Office Bearers are trained and validated in Module 1 (Executive) of The Scout Association's National Adult Training Scheme by Dunfermline District Scout Council. A full Induction Pack is provided to new members covering:

- The obligations of the Trustees
- Funding and the current financial position as set out in the latest accounts.

There are no plans to alter the policies or change the objectives of the charity.

Trustees receive an annual update on their responsibilities.

Risks

The Group is dependent upon receiving sufficient funding and donations to enable it to continue to work towards achieving its objectives. The Committee has carried out an assessment of all the major risks (including those related to Health & Safety) and is satisfied that it has systems or procedures in place to manage those risks. All Leaders, regular helpers and Office Bearers must be members of the Protecting Vulnerable Groups (PVG) scheme or have had an enhanced Disclosure through The Scout Association from Disclosure Scotland within the past 5 years. All adult members have also undertaken and been validated for GDPR to ensure that all personal data held by the Group is done so securely and in line with the current legislation.

Objectives and Activities

The aim of the Group is to promote the purpose of Scouting which is that Scouting exists to actively engage and support young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society. The Group is organised in line with the Values of Scouting which are that as Scouts we are guided by these values:

Integrity - We act with integrity; we are honest, trustworthy and loyal.

Respect - We have self-respect and respect for others.

Care - We support others and take care of the world in which we live.

Belief - We explore our faiths, beliefs and attitudes.

Co-operation - We make a positive difference; co-operate with others, make friends.

Volunteers

In addition to 18 uniformed leaders, approximately 25 parents of young people attending the Scout Group helped with various activities to raise funds or just to help out. It is difficult to put a monetary value on this input, but the results of our volunteer help can easily be appreciated.

Achievements and Performance

It has been another successful year for the Scout Group with all of our members progressing through the Award Scheme, gaining their Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum and Diamond Chief Scout's Awards as well as numerous Activity Badges. Each section has had its highlights and these are detailed earlier in the Annual Report.

The Group provides a programme of activities including progression through the various Scouting awards. We link what we do to the four capacities of the Scottish Government's Curriculum for Excellence and try to develop successful learners; confident individuals; effective contributors; and responsible citizens. Where possible we ensure that our members are achieving a number of the experiences and outcomes set by the government. We provide activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Villages area, based in Cairneyhill, with a current membership of 104.

Scouting takes place when young people, in partnership with adults, work together based on the values of Scouting and:

- enjoy what they are doing and have fun
- take part in activities indoors and outdoors
- learn by doing
- share in spiritual reflection
- take responsibility and make choices
- undertake new and challenging activities
- make and live by their Promise.

The Scout Group in Cairneyhill provides a community facility for the village that is regularly used by the Primary School; Mothers & Toddlers; the Brownies; the Youth Club; Karate and Dance Groups; Dog Training Classes, Adult Exercise Classes, Football Teams and for one-off lets. It is used as a Polling Station for elections. We also provide two 17-seater minibuses that are regularly used by a variety of local groups from playgroups to groups of those who are retired and manage an 8-seater minibus for Fife Council for use by those throughout the West Fife Villages. Scouting in Cairneyhill is most definitely a part of the community, not apart from the community, and will continue to support others in the future.

Financial Review

The Statement of Financial Activities shows net surplus for the year of £4,320 (2018 – net deficit £9,835). A total of £478,845 was retained in accumulated funds at the year-end (2018 – £262,182).

Reserves Policy

The Group Executive Committee have agreed that the level of free reserves, being the unrestricted and designated funds which are required to sustain operations in the event of unforeseen adverse future financial events should be a minimum of three months operating costs. Free reserves at 31 March 2019 amounted to £17,864 and this meets the current requirements.

Plans for the Future

The Group remains committed to providing an exciting programme of activities for those aged 6-25 in the West Fife Village area.

Independent Examiners Report to the Trustees

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared on the receipts & payments basis in accordance with:

- (a) The Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005
- (b) The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended)

Last year's accounts were prepared on an accruals basis, but as that is no longer required due to the increased threshold for such accounts, the Trustees decided to go with a Receipts and Payments format going forward. This has resulted in the total funds brought forward as at 1/4/18 being revised from £257,908 to £262,182 as a result of the Net Current Assets figure of £12,107 being changed to reflect the actual bank balances of £16,381.

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Fund Accounting

- (a) Unrestricted funds are those that can be expended at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the charity.
- (b) Designated funds are unrestricted funds that the trustees have set aside for particular purposes. The designation is administrative only and does not restrict the trustees' ability to apply funds.
- (c) Restricted funds are those that may only be used for specific purposes. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor, or when funds are raised for specific purposes.

Taxation

- (a) The charity is not liable to corporation tax or capital gains tax on its charitable activities.
- (b) The charity is not registered for VAT, thus all costs are shown inclusive of VAT charged.

Fixed Assets

Heritable Property is recorded at cost and Motor Vehicles are recorded at current value. Equipment has been recorded at an insurance value based on estimated replacement cost.
